USFS	Report for PMFSC 2/22/25 Prescribed fire was planned for the week of February 3rd in Observatory Unit 1 (near the campground/adjacent to Canfield) but surface conditions were still too dry, and burn was cancelled. ➤ _ Successful 2 days of burning on 2/11-12 in Jeff Valley Unit 18 − _ 36 acres of piles; and Jeff Valley Unit 13 − _ 5 acres of machine piles (at landing). ➤ _ We set up to continue the burn in Unit 18 on 2/13, but conditions became too wet to meet objectives. ➤ _ Likely be too wet to burn for the next week or two, depending on final rain totals post-storm. ➤ _ Top priorities are Jeff Valley Unit 18 and the Birch Hill Unit, adjacent to East Grade. We will begin preparations (putting in hose/snap tanks and control line improvements) for Birch Hill. Fuel composition of the piles in Birch Hill (large shrub piles) vs. Unit 18 (large diameter logs) are much different. Observatory Unit 1 (small shrub piles) is the lowest priority unit but is in the plans to burn as well. The receptivity of fuels at these various locations will drive decisions for where/when we insert with fire. ➤ _ Comment sent to me recently regarding the need for fuel reduction needed around the Henshaw Overlook. This area was cut/piled and burned a couple of years ago. The Fuels Officer and I reevaluated it this week. Additionally, the Overlook is being partially reconstructed this year and with this activity expect some minor brush cutting to occur as needed. I think we can cut & and chip the regenerating shrubs around the Overlook within the footprint that was previously treated and intend to add this activity to the FY26 program of work. ➤ _ New addition to our Fuels Team, Jonathan Polanksy (Fuels 33) who started with us last month, as Rusty Sexton accepted a promotion to Battalion 31 (PRD, North). I expect there will be opportunities for Jon to become more engaged with FSC members and the happenings as he gets more integrated into the program.
