USFS	Dana Barre Fuels Management Report: (4/25/25)  -Birch Hill: Completed the Birch Hill prescribed burn (56 acres) unit for the year.  -Penny Pines: We still have 15 acres of timber piles within thePenny Pines: plantation that will be burned next year (with snow). The green timber was thinned last fall, and the wood was not cured enough to burn this season – hence the rollover RX work for next year.  -Observatory: Completed prescribed fire work in Observatory Unit 1 (8 acres).  -Jeff Valley: Completed prescribed fire work in Jeff Valley unit 18a (52 acres) & part of the Unit 13 machine piles (5 acres – burned what was cured). We have a much more prescribed fire work to do in Jeff Valley next season. Currently building a new burn plan to allow surface fire (versus just pile burning) which should open more opportunities and may help us increase our prescribed fire pace and scale as it relates to this project.  -Fry Creek: Have a cut/pile contract (prebid) meeting with prospective contractors at the end of this month; with planned contract start after Labor Day. It will be for 182 acres cut/pile and dead tree felling in Fry Creek.  -Jeff Valley: Have a 35-acre targeted (spray only cut shrub stumps and regrowth) herbicide spray contract planned to start the first week in June (estimated) for Jeff Valley units 3/8 (two most-western units above and west of Conifer Rd.)  -Aguanga: Have plans to broadcast burn on Aguanga Unit 2 (up to 100 acres - near High Point lookout) in mid-May – activity and accomplishments are weather dependent, of course.
